## Kings of Carnoustie

Tyrrell Hatton on track for historic defence of Alfred Dunhill Links Championship as new father Tommy Fleetwood ties for the lead with a course-record 63

They say Carnoustie is the most difficult of the three courses in the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship, but it looked anything but that as outstanding young golfer Tommy Fleetwood and defending champion Tyrrell Hatton, above, powered to the top of the leaderboard.

Both played near faultless rounds. Fleetwood's 63, which included nine birdies, was a new course record while there were seven birdies in Hatton's 65.

For Fleetwood, victory would be a unique way to celebrate the birth
of his son Franklin last week.
For Hatton it opens up the realistic prospect of becoming the first man ever to win back-to-back Alfred Dunhill Links titles.

They now share the lead on 11-under-par, one ahead of Belgium's Nicolas Colsaerts, and will renew their battle in their third rounds at Kingsbarns this morning

Fleetwood said: "Any time you have a course record, especially on a golf course like this, it's brilliant. I'm very proud at the moment."

He has only played one week in
seven leading up to the Alfred Dunhill Links and added: "I have been practising while I was at home, but I really enjoyed being back in competition where every shot counts."

Hatton said: "I'm happy with today's round. I got lucky a couple of times, but obviously you need that. The putter came alive for me.
"It's great to be back and I have good memories from last year. I've come into this event with a bit of form and I'm happy that I'm carrying it on."

# Fleetwood back with a record 63 

New dad says he 'didn't know what he was doing' as he claimed a course record at Carnoustie, while Nicolas Colsaerts again recovers from a bad start

Tommy Fleetwood's 63 led an assault on Carnoustie as the new dad put all those sleepless nights behind him to share the lead with Tyrrell Hatton at 11-under.
Fleetwood, right, said he simply found his rhythm in the middle of a round that gives him a great chance of winning a title in his first outing as a father.
He said: "Today, I played well. Putted well. It just unravels really. Sometimes it does that. Most of the time, those are your best rounds when you don't quite realise what you're doing. But I had that really hot streak from 11 where I had good chances, 7, 8, 9, all chances that burnt the edge. I made the most of the par fives and holed a couple of putts, and there you go."
Hatton put his superb 65 at Carnoustie down to kind conditions
and a red-hot putter. The defending champion said: "Carnoustie is the toughest course, but it wasn't as tough as it can be, and l'm thankful for that. Yesterday was a really tough day [for conditions]. I certainly wouldn't have enjoyed playing Carnoustie in that wind, you can only play what's in front of you and I was very fortunate today.

Colsaerts finished one back after another fine round, this time over the Old Course. As in his first round the Belgian was able to recover from a damaging start.

He said: "I made a double yesterday on the third and bounced back straightaway, and here it was exactly the same thing, so it kind of kept me moving forward. Even though you always are frustrated, I was able to keep my momentum."

## Drysdale leads home charge after his surge of late birdies

A storming finish from David Drysdale at Kingsbarns put the Scot in contention as the host nation's two newest pros aimed for the cut and their last Major winner left the tournament early.

Drysdale is on 8-under for the Championship after his 67 included five birdies in the last seven holes.

The golfer insists local knowl-
edge is vital to tackling the three links after playing this event for over a decade.

He said: "We know these courses so well, it's not necessary to practice at all. Just come out and have a wander and a look at the greens and get the pace of them.
"I've played them so many times, got all the knowledge and know all

the bounces and lies off tees. That's certainly key at St Andrews."

Stephen Gallacher is three further back after a 67 at the Old Course

But he said: "I could have shot 60 today, I missed five inside 12 feet. But it gets me back in the hunt."

Scott Jamieson is one further back after a second successive 70 , this one at the Old Course. Richie Ramsay is on the same score after carding a 71 at Kingsbarns.

Liam Johnston, left, is making his pro debut at the Championship and finished his second round at the Old Course on 2-under. In just his second start, fellow rookie Connor Syme walked off at Kingsbarns on the same score.

However, Syme was frustrated saying: "I felt like it could have been a few better, but 70 is not a disaster.
"I dropped silly shots but I didn't feel any nerves today. There are positives to take into St Andrews."

The 1999 Open Champion Paul Lawrie could not continue in this year's tournament and left yesterday with a foot injury


## First sub-par at Carnoustie has Dunne in hunt

Paul Dunne kept up his good form yesterday as he targets back-toback tournament victories

The first round pacesetter carded a 68 at Carnoustie yesterday to stay within two shots of joint leaders Tommy Fleetwood and Tyrrell Hatton at 9-under-par.

The Irishman, who won the British Masters last week, said ahead of his third round at Kingsbarns: "It's hard to know where you sit until everyone has played all three courses because everyone has a different test ahead of them today.
"I'll try to play as well as I can and hopefully have a chance to win tomorrow."

Dunne, who famously led The Open after 54 holes as an amateur at St Andrews in 2015, admits he "struggled" through the first five yesterday.

But he added: "From the sixth, I started to hit it well. I started to play the golf I've been playing over the last couple of weeks and was pretty stress-free.
"The greens here are the firmest of the three. They are the firmest

and the quickest when it gets windy, that makes the course really tricky, so it's nice to get this on a calm day and be able to post a score.
"This is the first time l've broken par here, so pretty good
"It's nice to get this on a calm day and be able to post a score. On the other two courses, the score is right there even if the wind blows."

The star, who played with amateur Jeff Kelter, added: "My game is feeling good and hopefully I can make a few birdies at Kingsbarns.
"Hopefully I can just continue playing the way I am and keep shooting 4 or 5-under."

## Kaymers hoping for family fortune with caddie father

Major champion Martin says playing with brother Philip and Dad Horst can inspire them to victory

It's a real family affair for the Kaymers at the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship. Brothers Martin and Philip are playing together for the third time with Dad Horst being employed as Philip's caddie.

Philip, who is also Martin's manager, says: "Usually, Martin and I only get to play golf together about ten times a year, so to be able to play in the Team Championship as a partnership this week means that - hopefully we'll get to play four days in a row! That would be good."

The top 20 teams, after three rounds, will qualify to play in the final round on the Old Course tomorrow - and Martin is no stranger to success in this tournament, having won the individual title in 2010 after just being pipped in 2008 when Robert Karlsson won a three-way play-off also featuring England's Ross Fisher.

The Kaymer brothers, from Germany, had a solid start on Thursday, posting a first round team score of

67 and Martin shooting a one-under par 71 on the Old Course. At Carnoustie, in the second round, they carded a 68 to finish 9-under.

They'll tee off at Kingsbarn at $9.33 a m$ today.

Philip, who also partnered Martin in 2008 and 2013, added: "I was able to do quite a bit of practice on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, which was good, and with Dad on my bag it's very special for the three of us to be together all week.
"This event is just getting better every year. It's a great tournament."

And Martin, the former US Open and US PGA champion, said: "To have my brother Philip as my manager makes it a unique relationship. Firstly, there is never any doubt and he has my complete confidence and trust.
"Also, you know that as a family member he always has my best interests at heart. I can be very honest with him and he can be very honest with me."



## Jones hunts for next big thing in golf

Dragons' Den star Peter Jones admits he's desperate to make a golf-related investment on the BBC show. The entrepreneur has successfully invested in other sports including tennis, but called out for more golf pitches.

He said: "I've always wanted and hoped somebody would come into the Den with a golf investment.
"So, come on everybody, you must have a golf-related idea you can pitch! I have invested in tennis and that's doing well. We need more people to think of golf inventions."

Jones is making his fourth appearance at the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship and always relishes playing St Andrews, Kingsbarns and Carnoustie.

The eight-handicapper added "You know why it's so special it's the Home of Golf. But there are so many great things to come out of it, with the work the tournament does with charities. That makes my heart sing.
"I don't play as much as I'd like. I go away in the summer and play in Portugal. I'm a bit of a fairweather golfer but I take any opportunity to get out. I'd love to get my handicap down."

Jones, playing with pro partner Jack Davidson this year, has yet to make the cut but remains hopeful. He smiled: "I'd sacrifice so many investments to play at the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship on the Sunday."

The tycoon and Welsh star Davidson are 8-under in the Team Championship after a round of 66 at Kingsbarns yesterday ahead of today's 9am tee-off on the Old Course.


# Klitschko: 18 holes as bruising as 12 rounds 

Former heavyweight champ insists golfers need the same sustained mental focus as boxers do in ring

Boxing champion Wladimir Klitschko compares some of the demands of golf with those of his own sport, admitting: "I'm not in love with golf but I do kind of like it!"

The former world heavyweight champion is making his second appearance at the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship after a nine-year gap.

The Ukrainian fighter, who retired from the ring in August at the age of 41, said: "There are similarities between golf and boxing - you have to be mentally focused, for a start, over 18 holes in golf and over 12 or 15 rounds in boxing.
"Golf is a hobby for me, but I wish I could get better. But it's really

enjoyable to come here again and play alongside the professionals and other amateurs from lots of different fields. One thing is different between boxing and golf, though: they don't boo you in golf if you do something wrong! They just stay silent!
"The weather has been so much better this time than nine years ago, when it was rainy and windy. It was like California at Carnoustie!
"It's been a lot of fun and another thing you learn from golf is that even the professionals miss shots."

The Alfred Dunhill Links Championship celebrates links golf at its finest and is played over the Old Course at St Andrews, the Championship Course at Carnoustie and Kingsbarns Golf Links. The final round, after the cut is made on Saturday, is played over the Old Course.

With a total prize fund of US\$5 million, there are two separate competitions - an individual professional tournament and the Team Championship, in which each professional is paired with an amateur.

men the chance to play golf, work with professional coaches and find work in the golf industry,

Botham - who was in a fourball with Bishop yesterday - reflected on Bishop's remarkable story.

The former England all-rounder, who has played in all 17 Alfred Dunhill Links Championships, said: "His attitude is the thing that impresses me the most. Golf's given him a new lease of life. It's great what he does, spreading the word and being out front for the charity
"I introduced myself to him, had a chat, and he said 'Just call me Bish, everyone does'. So I said 'OK Bish, I'm Beefy, how are you?' I admire people like lan. He's gone out there and told people it's not the end of the road."

Botham and pro partner Marcus Fraser shot a team score of 69 at Kingsbarns to be 4-under for the Team Championship, while Bishop and Wade Ormsby sit on 10-under after a 66.
